- 3. Does the writer use very specific words (instead of words like "a lot," "thing," "stuff," "very," etc.)?

- 5. Do the sentences hold your interest?
- 6. Do the sentences flow together smoothly?
- 7. Does the writer use transitions to help the sentences flow smoothly from one to the other?

CONVENTIONS

- 8. Are there any spelling errors? If so, circle them.
- 9. Are there any punctuation errors? If so, circle them.
- 10. Are there any run-on sentences? If so, circle them.
- 11. Are there any fragment sentences? If so, circle them.

PRESENTATION

- 12. Is the essay typed, 12-point, Times New Roman, double spaced?
- 13. Is the essay at least 400 words long?
